




Updates From our Staff:

I began Grief Share in 2017 and continue to be blessed by the people I meet through this support group.





An Emmanuel "Favorite Scripture or Saying" Challenge response:



Mary Keifer shared the following: "I wanted to share a Scripture that has always meant a great deal to me: It's Romans 8:35-39, "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? As it is written: "For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered. No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, neither height nor depth, nor anything else

"This verse has been one that has helped me to see that, in Christ, we are not only connected to God but with that connection, we stand in a place of victory "MORE than conquerors". A conqueror has already won so to be more than a winner tells me that no matter what stands in my path to tell me that I'm separated or parted from God, I can look in the face and say (knowing victory is already sure), "In Christ, you don't separate me from anyone. Jesus has given me victory over you and I can stand firm because of Him."
